



Abstract space

- = made real through buying and selling of plots of land
- money form (Harvey)
- commodity form (Lefebvre)

= enables the making real of social relations:
"Social relations, which are concrete abstractions, gain real existence only in and through space.
Their medium is spatial."

Sources of revenue

Territory

"territoriality": "the attempt by an individual or group (x) to influence, affect, or control objects, people, and relationships (y) by delimiting and asserting control over a geographic area. This area is the territory."



Land under financialized capitalism

- ground rent extracted from plots of land (= territories) in global networks of (financial) capital circulation
- creating and destroying places
- on various scales
